



Summertime is never slow at the Okemos Library. That's because the library becomes a central place for families. Family members of all ages want to read as part of our summer reading challenge. This year's theme was "A Universe of Stories," a space theme to commemorate the 50th anniversary of NASA landing people on the moon.

This year, 8,965 people enrolled across our 13 locations, with 1,712 enrolled at the Okemos branch alone. That includes babies, kids, teens and adults. The original idea of the summer reading program was to keep students reading for fun during the summer so they wouldn't experience the summer slide in reading ability. Then, pre-reading babies were added to help parents learn that it's never too early to read to your baby. Then, adults wanted in on the fun. Yes, children will read for trinkets, and adults will read for small pieces of chocolate.

Ours is a 9-week program, and we had people signing up with less than week to go. The summer reading program was so popular that we ran out of prizes and had to run out to various stores to find candy and trinkets. We had to scrounge around and ask other branches if they had any spare supplies, any stuff we could use as prizes.

All that busyness is in part funded by The Friends. Therefore, when I hear about how busy we are, how messy the kids, are and how much traffic there is the parking lot, I can say, The Friends make it all possible.

In recent years, our Friends' family and library staff have mourned the passing of several who worked so diligently on behalf of the Okemos Library. Joan Smith, Don Austreng, Ruth Ann Ference, and Betty Hagberg immediately come to mind. In each case, the Friends of the Okemos Library received memorials on their behalf.

Joan Smith, past Head Librarian, helped shepherd our little library from behind the fire barn to its current building. The Friends along with Joan's family chose a 'living' memorial, a lovely plant-shaded arbor with bench and urn, located right on the library grounds.

Don, whose career included work in the book trade industry, was active in our Thursday Elves Group. Weekly, this group sorts book donations, and prices special editions for our quarterly used book sales. Tribute monies for Don were unrestricted, and they purchased a variety of programs for the library.

Ruth Ann spent her volunteer time working the used book sales. Over the years, she helped set up on the preceding Friday nights, then cashiered sales Saturday and Sunday, or helped with post-sale cleanups. Wherever needed, Ruth Ann was a stalwart active supporter. Her tribute memorials will focus on our Friends' next big project, a renovated kitchen (see related article).

Betty, with over 40 years in the Friends' organization, was both officer and member of our Board of Directors. Betty's artistic talent helped promote our organization's events with whimsical posters populated with delightful Grant Woods-esque people, animals, and yes, frogs, all awash in personality. Again, those monies will be directed to the kitchen project.

These four Friends all had a great love of libraries, particularly our Okemos Library. The remembrances of family and friends honor their dedication.



#### Un Traductor (Cuba) - Thursday, October at 6:30 p.m.

In the wake of the Chernobyl nuclear disaster, Malin, a Russian literature professor at The University of Havana, is sent to translate between Cuban doctors and children sent from the USSR for medical treatment. Torn from the abstract world of academia and forced into the relentlessly real world of medicine, Malin becomes increasingly depressed. When he meets a child, who tells him a story, Malin connects with the kids and finds his way through. Just as he adapts to his new job, the Berlin Wall falls and Cuba enters the deepest economic crisis the island has ever known. But Malin is now so entrenched in the lives of the Chernobyl children that he doesn't notice his young family suffering. He must find his way back to his wife and child through the lessons he learns at the hospital – and become a better person on the way.

#### I am Not a Witch (Zambia) - Thursday, November 21 at 6:30 p.m.

In her award-winning debut feature, Rungano Nyoni crafts a satiric feminist fairy-tale set in present-day Zambia. When 9-year-old orphan Shula is accused of witchcraft, she is exiled to a witch camp run by Mr. Banda, a corrupt and inept government official. Tied to the ground by a white ribbon, Shula is told that she will turn into a goat if she tries to escape. As the only child witch, Shula quickly becomes a local star and the adults around her exploit her supposed powers for financial gain. Soon she is forced to make a difficult decision – whether to resign herself to life in the camp or take a risk for freedom. A hit at over 50 international festivals, I Am Not A Witch is a must-see for anyone interested in new African cinema and contemporary female filmmakers.





#### The Paris Opera (France) - Thursday, December 19 at 6:30 p.m.

Sweeping in scope yet full of intimate moments, The Paris Opera offers a candid look behind the scenes of one of the world's foremost performing arts institutions. Over the course of one tumultuous season, director Jean-Stephane Bron nimbly juggles multiple storylines - from ballet and opera rehearsals, to strike negotiations, last minute crises and ticket disputes - revealing the dedication of the talented personnel who bring breathtaking spectacles to the stage night after night.

# Cooking Up Plans!

With the major renovation of the Okemos Library six years behind us, adjustments and changes to that upgrade have slowly become necessary. During the last two years, additional furniture was purchased for the Teen Area and Quiet Reading Room. More educational equipment for the children's area, including a busybox and a game table, have been "put into play." New flooring replaced carpeting in the back hallway to better handle the heavy foot traffic. These additions have all been paid for by contributions from the Friends of the Library.

We now turn our attention to the Library staff kitchen. It was installed when the building was built in 1978. At that time, it was a private business, which in following years held several smaller businesses. In 2001, the building was purchased by Meridian Township to be turned into a Library. While there was still no change to its basic kitchen layout, appliances were added occasionally replaced as needed. The 2013 renovation came and went, again without enhancing the kitchen. Library staff by necessity use this area as a lunchroom and break room, and also as a glorified hallway to the back office area.

Because of this history, the Friends have voted to focus attention on this long-neglected area. The Township, as owner of the building, is working with a professional contractor/kitchen planner to develop a design to make the space more efficient. We should be ready for construction late this year, and for a brand new kitchen early next year.

We may have to hold a fundraiser or two to finance this project. The cost, we have been advised, may exceed \$20,000. Should you wish to offer a contribution toward this project, please make your check payable to Friends of the Okemos Library and earmark the Memo for Kitchen Renovation.

We hope we 'stirred-up' your interest in this project. We will keep our members posted as we watch it heat up.
