This husband and wife team are motivated by a most unusual passion in the home-buying field: they own (and love!) their Sears "Hamilton" kit home. The roomy Hamilton home came on the scene over a century ago and is a beautiful specimen of kit housing. The Mutches have made it their mission to identify these kit-built beauties all throughout the Upper Midwest.

Join the Friends of the Okemos Library for their Spring Strawberry event on Saturday, May 20 from 12-2 p.m. at the Okemos Library to listen to stories the Mutches have to tell from their Midwest travels. They will describe how they located and photographed these kit-built





Everything Old is New Again Housing - Then and Now

The Friends of the Library are a group that embraces reform, growth, and change. We need that change to foster ever-evolving ideas, which beget new growth, so the cycle renews itself and stays relevant. And yet, as a group, we equally embrace tradition and the values that define our roots.

This year, our Friends' group celebrates its 64th birthday, and we find ourselves reflecting about the past, while looking proactively toward the future. We aim to continue keeping up with new ideas while being faithful to the old ones.

A good example of the traditional versus the new is in the field of housing. At our time-honored **Spring Strawberry Event** presentation (see front page) we will look back a hundred years at a particular style of "Kit Homes" that became all the rage in the early 1900s. Revisiting these period homes will show us how our grandparents defined "new and affordable" housing. These Kit Homes could be ordered right through the U.S. Mail from a catalog! Buyers just had to choose a design that fit their lifestyle and pocketbook, order it, and *voila*! it appeared off the rail car with everything included: lumber, windows, doors, and nails. All top quality materials. Downright revolutionary!

Contrasting that with a look at the latest trend in modern housing, another style of Kit Home is now becoming a movement of its own: the "Tiny House." It is turning on its ear the "bigger is better" home construction styles in recent decades, committed as it is to "small, small, small." Caravan-style tiny mobile homes are hitting the open road in growing numbers. Super-small cabins are another form of this trend, as both styles conform to what a growing population segment wants: a simpler, more utilitarian, lifestyle.

Tiny Houses offer more freedom, adventure, and mobility, and require very little investment and overhead. Just watching this movement pick up pace makes those with standard homes wonder "Could I do something that bold?"

Maybe. Many who watch these Tiny Houses gain popularity open their closets one morning to de-clutter their living spaces, and by day's end are calling their realtors to downsize to smaller homes.

Will Tiny Houses stand the test of time and be available one hundred years from now? Stay tuned. We hope the Friends of the Library will be here in 100 years to answer that question.




The Automatic Hate (USA) – Thursday, April 20 at 6:30 p.m.
