Ms. Nichols will have lovely orchids on display as a striking background to the shadowy, stormy history of the plant that she will describe for us. She will also offer tips for growing orchids. This backgrounder will provide us with an insider's view of what to expect at the Greater Lansing Orchid Society's Annual Show and Sale the following weekend at MSU.

These folks are serious about their plants! They know there's more to this delicate, sculptural rarity than the general public knows. These exotic blooms symbolize subtle refinement,

luxury and mystery, so prepare to be impressed and inspired about this largest flowering plant family on earth--and one of the oldest.

The Role of the Friends of the Okemos Library

When many area residents who love their library want to do more for it than just own a library card, they join the Friends of the Okemos Library.

The Friends of the Okemos Library is a separate, distinct organization from the Capital Area District Library. The Friends has tax-exempt 501(c)(3) status, so any gifts given to the Friends are tax deductible to the extent of the law. 100% of donors' money assists the Okemos Library with programs, special events, children's activities, upgrading equipment and furnishings, and more. When "extras" go beyond the library budget--or the Township's contribution for building upkeep, the Friends step in to provide a safety net for those needs.

Volunteers are the backbone of the Friends of the Okemos Library. There are no paid officers or staff that do the Friends' work. They are motivated by a love of the library and desire to improve it.

Giving time is the ultimate gift to your library because it takes "people power," in addition to money, to carry out many of the library's programs. For instance, Friends staff information-tables, they create "kitchen magic" to enrich programs and events, and they provide the physical work of sorting and setting up the circa-7,000 books at each of our quarterly used book sales. In other words, Friends deliver the spirited participation and warm touch that make these events memorable.

While dues and donations are of budgetary importance and keep the Friends responsive to library needs, equally important is that old saying, "*many hands make light work*." If you have a few extra hours a month to offer, consider becoming a Friend. The group is fun and friendly, and would love to work with you! Your time will be richly rewarded, your connections to the community enhanced, and you will be working for an institution you cherish.

In 1916, while war rages in the Ottoman Empire, Hussein raises his younger brother Theeb ("Wolf") in a traditional Bedouin community that is isolated by the vast, unforgiving desert. The brothers' quiet existence is suddenly interrupted when a British Army officer and his guide ask Hussein to escort them to a water well located along the old pilgrimage route to Mecca. So as not to dishonor his recently deceased father, Hussein agrees to lead them on the long and treacherous journey. The young, mischievous Theeb secretly chases after his brother, but the group soon find themselves trapped amidst threatening terrain riddled with Ottoman mercenaries, Arab revolutionaries, and outcast Bedouin raiders.
