At Long Last the Wait is OVER! Friends Book Sale Returns in July!

It's hard to believe that more than year has passed since we were able to browse the Used Book Sales tables loaded heavy with all manner of interesting books. This huge and popular event, sponsored by The Friends of the Okemos Library, is scheduled again on Saturday and Sunday, July 24 & 25, mark your calendars for this one! New Hours are as follows: for the general public this sale will start at 9:00 a.m. and go through 7 p.m., both days. (On Saturday, the browsing begins an hour earlier FOR MEMBERS ONLY, from 8:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m.) On Sunday, the book sale hours are from 9:00 a.m. through 2 p.m., then continues on with the BAG SALE, from 2 p.m. to 7 p.m.



NEW VENUE: For this Used Book Sale, the Friends are setting up in the temporary location of the Old Farmer's Market--across the parking lot from the Township Hall at 5151 Marsh Road, Okemos MI 48864. This is the OLD Farmers Market location.

Masks will be required in the pavilion.

CAVEAT: <u>Do not be confused by the other event being held the same day across Central</u> <u>Park Drive at the New Farmer's Market</u>. That event, the original Farmers Market, will also be selling their wares, mostly fruit and veggies.

While the location may be different, the book set-up will be familiar: we plan to offer the full complement of used books: Fiction, Non-fiction, Children's, and Special Issues, Social Science, Literature, Biography, and more, along with a wide selection of CDs, DVDs and Books-on-Tape. Prices are the same, \$.50 for paperbacks and \$1.00 for most hardback books. However, our new price for a bag of books moves to a modest \$5.00 per bagful.

The Friends board met via ZOOM, keeping in touch with me and each other. The staff lunches the Friends provided were great morale boosters.

I am eager to start this next phase of COVID-19 recovery. Please say hello to me the next time you visit the library. It will be wonderful to see you again.

Service to the Community

Eagle-eyed patrons waiting for their books at the Curbside Pickup will have noticed a recent colorful addition to the library landscape. This is the new Micro Food Pantry. It is located near the Curbside Pickup area and is painted bright green, orange, and blue. You can't miss it.

The Pantry was installed with the collaborative sponsorship of CADL, Meridian Township government, and Faith Lutheran Church. The Pantry itself was built by Meridian Company, formerly Meridian Plumbing, which supplied it with the first full stock of food. Faith Lutheran Church applied for the pantry permit and will help with ongoing food and household products. Librarian Betsy Hull and her staff have also volunteered to assist by shuttling supplies on a daily basis to the outdoor pantry location to replenish its inventory.

A motto about Micro Food Pantries says, "Take what you need and Bring what you can." This is an opportunity for everyone, our Friends members as well as area residents, to help those who need basic foods, personal supplies and household supplies. Take a look for yourself at the pantry and the brochure to get an idea of the types of non-
