Used Book Sale Events Return

Adjustments and Work Arounds were the game for over a year and a half during the COVID Pandemic. The Friends' Book Sale COVID response was to make major adjustments to the Used Book Sale regimen by making book collections while gloved and masked at donator's homes as long as the library was closed to the public.

"We've been collecting books from donors at their homes during the course of the COVID Pandemic. Invariably at each stop, people would ask when we would be able to hold a used book sale again," recalled Jim Tellner, chair of the Friends' Used Book Sale. "By July of this year, when authorities eased restrictions, we felt it was safe enough to hold our first used book sale since March 2020. We chose the location of the Old Farmer's Market at Meridian Township Hall, a covered

outdoor pavilion, as our sale-site. It was a safe choice. And many folks agreed and were ready to refresh their reading supply."

Our next book sale will be on September 11-12, 2021 at the Masonic Center in downtown Okemos details to come. Look for our postcard announcements.




