Forgotten History: Uncovering the Story

Finally! We are just weeks away from the Friends of the Okemos Library's Fall Event which we announced in the Summer 2020 newsletter! To refresh your memory, I refer to the celebration of the First Nations' peoples. Please join us as the world of the Anishinaabe of the Great Lakes opens up to us, and we hear the history of the Three Fires People long before Michigan was a state. We hope to reunite with you at this annual "Thank You to the Friends Members" as we learn of the strong cultural heritage that the First Nations of the Ojibwe, Odawa, and Potawatomi share, as well as some of their differences.

Patricia Shackleton, a member of the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of the Chippewa (Ojibwe), will be our speaker at this Light Brunch on **Tuesday, September 13, at 1:00 p.m. at the Okemos Library.** Patricia did her graduate work on the effects of the clash between the dominant White Culture and the Native peoples. She will guide us on a tour of both the positive aspects of the Native culture, as well as the more modern issues



exemplified by the abduction of native American children, the role of Indian Boarding Schools in suppressing the cultural heritage and its long-reaching effects even today, and the results of some of the official government policies. She will also touch on a modern version of the traditional birch bark cutwork, and talk about the craft of Native American storytelling.

As always, attendees at this Friends' Membership Thank You event will enjoy light refreshments featuring tea and other tasty delicacies. The event is free for current Friends' members, and \$10.00 for non-members. Space is limited, so *make reservations early*. This can be done either by mail or at the library. Make checks out to Friends of the Okemos Library and mail them, or drop them off at the Library, 4321 Okemos Road, Okemos. Reservations are needed by Friday, September 9.







From the Librarian's Desk



My name is Tom Moore. For the past two years I have served as the Head Librarian for CADL's Haslett Branch. Following Betsy Hull's retirement, I will be taking over as the Head Librarian for both the Haslett and Okemos Libraries. For many, news of this change has caused some concern and so I would like to take a moment to provide some background and introduce myself a bit.

In 2019 we began restructuring the leadership positions for the Lansing Branches (Downtown, South and Foster) to unite the three libraries under a single regional manager position. To support this position, we hired Public Services Heads that serve as building managers for each location. We believed that we could better serve the Lansing community through better coordination and collaboration between the branches. We could reduce some of the duplicated efforts of the staff to deliver services, avoid overlapping outreach services, and share the talents of our staff across the three buildings.

Following the model of the Lansing Libraries, I will oversee operations of both the Meridian Libraries and coordinate the direction and services our two libraries are offering. We will be evaluating the staffing levels and needs to determine what will be necessary for this new model to be successful.

I believe strongly that libraries are places of community and connections. Libraries help connect people to resources and information, to educational and entertainment materials, but also to each other. Libraries help tie the community together by giving our residents a place meet and connect through our ability to help foster connections between residents, resources, and organizations we can help our community thrive.

I have been working in libraries for 15 years, starting as a library page at our Mason Branch in 2007, then a library assistant here in Meridian at the Haslett Branch in the old building, then for ten years as the Head of Adult Services for the Delta Township District Library before returning to serve as the Head Librarian of the Haslett Branch in 2020.

I know big changes like this can cause a great deal of concern and anxiety. I am anxious myself, but I am also excited for the opportunities that lie ahead. If you have questions, concerns, comments, or even a little advice I would love to hear from you. I have always felt that the Library Friends are the library's greatest allies in the community, from your financial support to your advocacy, you play an essential part in our success. I know for you to be successful you need to have accurate information and a good sense of where the library is heading. Please reach out if you have any questions or suggestions. I always welcome your input.



The Third Wife (Vietnamese-Vietnam) – Thursday, September 15 at 6:30 p.m.

In late 19th century Vietnam, fourteen-year-old May becomes the third wife to a wealthy landowner. She quickly learns that she can gain status and security if she gives birth to a male child, but her burgeoning attraction to Xuan, the second wife, puts her fragile standing in jeopardy. As May observes the unfolding tragedy of forbidden love and its devastating consequences, she must make a choice, to either carry on in silence, or forge a path towards personal freedom.

Zombie Child (French & Creole - Haiti) – Thursday, October 20 at 6:30 p.m.

Haiti, 1962. A man is brought back from the dead only to be sent to the living hell of the sugarcane fields. Election Results ~ Tip of the Hat



The Friends, patrons and supporters of the Capital Area District Libraries have done themselves proud! A big **THANK YOU** for the positive election results at the polls that demonstrate the voters' unqualified support of good quality library programs, staff, and services.

The millage restoration vote on August 2 provides CADL with almost \$12.5 million for the first year which equates to 90% of the Library's budget. It is no exaggeration to say that should this millage have failed there would be no CADL library by the end of the first quarter of 2023. The results demonstrated an enthusiastic support of just over 2 to 1 in favor of the millage proposal. Final vote count was Yea: 33,957 votes, versus Nay: 15,550 votes.

Calling ALL Friends - We Need Your Help!

Volunteers are the backbone of an organization like the Friends of the Okemos Library. No paid officers or staff do the work of the Friends. All people involved have a love of the library and a desire to do their part to make this institution better.

It takes "people power" to carry out many of the Friends' programs. <u>Your</u> time and effort help this organization accomplish its goal to support the Okemos library.

Currently there are several voluntary opportunities open in the Friends:

 Manual laborers and strong backs are needed to haul about 280 boxes of books from storage space to sales venue the Friday before the book sales start. There is a morning shift and an afternoon shift: 9:00 - 11:00 a.m. is the morning truck loading shift and the afternoon shift unloads the truck from 12:00 - 2:00 p.m. Dollies are provided.



- Many individuals are needed to sort, set-up and sell about 10,000 books at each of our quarterly used book sales. Also required is staffing for checking-out functions during sales time. Three - and two-hour shifts are available.
- Third need is for Friends who have some extra hours a month to consider becoming active through the Friends' Board. It's a fun group! We meet once a month during the school year. For an investment of limited volunteer time, you benefit by making a commitment to a community facility you use and value.

While dues and donations are important to the budget and allow the Friends to be responsive to library needs, "many hands make light work" is vitally important to keep all library events running.

Library Little Free Pantry Needs Donations

In these times of both health and economic uncertainty, having a free food pantry available 24/7 is a marvel for those who find themselves in need of a few additional food items to stretch their budget to make a meal for their families.



The Little Free Pantry location is Library Sponsored/Community Supported. As such there is an on-going need for food to be available in the pantry. Food donations are being accepted from both Friends of the Library members and Okemos area residents.

Pantry items that have been popular are: breakfast cereals, Pop Tarts, protein products such as peanut butter, protein bars, canned tuna or canned chicken. Other items needed include crackers, rice, boxed sides or entrees (other than Mac & cheese), pasta, pasta sauces, microwaveable entrée cups, canned fruits, toilet paper, paper towels, shampoo, face tissue, and dish soaps.

Donate with Wisdom, being mindful of how your donation of goods can tolerate the weather. This Pantry, while available 24/7, is not weather resistant. Depending on the time of year placed in the pantry, fresh fruit, eggs, and vegetables will either freeze or cook, considering the climate extremes of late. Farm produce in season can be displayed on cardboard outside the Pantry. The Pantry cannot accept cans, bags, or bottles that have

been opened or partially used, nor products with an outdated Use-By Code.
