
latest environmental impact solutions at our annual Friends' Spring event.

LeRoy's Green Team at Meridian Township facilitates the township-wide initiatives, offers educational seminars, and works on climate initiatives, stormwater management, recycling, and wetland protections. In 2007 the Township joined over 1000 other communities in signing onto the U.S. Mayor's Climate Protection Agreement. The long-term goal of this initiative is to significantly reduce greenhouse gas emissions. The implementation of the agreement will enable us to make the com-LeRoy's team is working toward attaining significant energy and water cost

savings in the Township fleet and facilities with short-term goals of obtaining 50% of our electricity needs for government facilities through renewable resources by 2025 and by reducing the amount of materials sent to landfill by 10% in five years.

This month-long celebration is encouraging people of all ages to read every day. At our Okemos and Haslett Branches we will be highlighting the works of picture book authors Jane Yolen and Bob Shea, and in addition to our regular line up of story times and book clubs, we will be capping the month off with a dinosaur-themed line up of programs during Spring Break, March 27-31.

But *March is Reading Month* is not just for the kids. We encourage everyone to take the time to open a book and read this spring. Step into a story and be transported to a different place or time, see the world through another's eyes or learn something new. When you have had your fill of reading join us for one of many great events happening at the library this spring. Whether you attend an event, check out a book, or simply sit and use our wi-fi, we will be happy to see you in the library this spring, so come on in and say, "Hello!"





Corpus Christi (Poland –Polish) • Thursday, March 16 at 6:00 p.m.

Anchored by a "dynamically physical, wild-eyed performance" (The Hollywood Reporter) from newcomer Bartosz Bielenia, Corpus Christi is an incisive, darkly humorous, and "engrossing exploration of faith, second chances and the possibility of atonement" (Screen).

After spending years in a Warsaw prison for a violent crime, 20-year-old Daniel is released and sent to a remote village to work as a manual laborer. The job is designed to keep the ex-con busy, but Daniel has a

higher calling. Over the course of his incarceration he has found Christ, and aspires to join the clergy - but his criminal record means no seminary will accept him. When Daniel arrives in town, one quick lie allows him to be mistaken for the town's new priest, and he sets about leading his newfound flock. Though he has no training, his passion and charisma inspire the community. At the same time, his unconventional sermons and unpriestly behavior raise suspicions among some of the townsfolk - even more so as he edges towards a dark secret that the community hasn't revealed in the confessional booth.



**Donbass** (Ukraine – Russian & Ukrainian) • Thursday, May 25 at 6:00 p.m.

In the Donbass region of Eastern Ukraine, mid-2010s: a hybrid war takes place, involving an open armed conflict alongside killings and robberies on a mass scale perpetrated by Russian-separatist gangs. In the Donbass, war is called peace, propaganda is uttered as truth, and hatred is declared to be love. Life is suffused with fear and suspicion. What is real and what is fake news? Called "a darkly satirical omnibus of scathing

vignettes" by the Washington Post, Donbass serves as a crucial interpretation of the Russo-Ukrainian war, but the film is not, ultimately, a tale of one region or one conflict. It is about a world lost in post-truth and fake identities. It is about each and every one of us. "There is no other antiwar film quite like Donbass" (Los Angeles Times).
